12 months ago in our 1443 (2022) report forward, we reflected over the importance of Time and how many don't seem capable of finding fulfilment in valuable endeavours due to the "scarcity of time" which results in bewilderment and disappointment. As Muslims, it is not alarmist to remind each other to heed the diminishing sands of time before that final solitary grain trickles out and the inevitable divine decree presents itself.

As ever, Allah's mercy encompasses all things and we forever cling on to that in spite of every shortcoming. The past few years have been an incredible challenge for the global community. Not only are the dire ramifications of Coronavirus still being felt, but fresh misery also erupted in the form of war between Russia and Ukraine, with the catastrophic events spelling unprecedented and far-reaching implications for Europe and the rest of the world. For the first time in many decades, a vicissitude in fortunes means western populations must contend with soaring and unaffordable costs of living. Far-flung corners of the world have also been greatly impacted with the threat of even more severe privations for the world's poorest people, as hunger and malnutrition claim countless lives.

As Muslims, particularly in Europe, who are caught up in any downturn in fortunes, we must remember foremost that "rizq" or provision of any kind is portioned out by Allah Almighty and He increases or decreases it as He wishes (Qur'an 89 v15,16).

Our continued gratitude to Allah for the innumerable blessings we have is paramount and determines our station with Him. My seven-year-old daughter (Allah bless her) loves soft toys, and would give away the very clothes on her back in return for more. However, she understands and concedes that in return for all the soft toys in the world, giving away one of her eyes is a price too great to bear.

"Whatever blessings you have is from Allah." (Qur'an 16 v53)

"And when your Lord proclaimed, 'If you are grateful, I will surely give you more'." (Qur'an 14 v7)

"Wondrous is the affair of the believer for there is good for him in every matter and this is not the case with anyone except the believer. If he is granted goodness, then he thanks Allah and thus there is good for him, and if he is harmed, then he shows patience and thus there is good for him." (Prophet Muhammad (pbuh), Sahih Muslim)

"I am amazed by the believer. Truly, Allah does not decree anything for the believer except what is good for him." (Prophet Muhammad (pbuh), Musnad Ahmad)

Every difficulty brings with it opportunity. Islamic teaching warns against trivialising any good deed, however slight it may seem. As servants of The Most High and The Most Wise, let us show the Almighty that, come what may, we shall continue championing the noblest principles of the Prophets of Allah. Let us show that we are capable and worthy of rising above this latest challenge with the fortitude to continue honouring orphans and widows and aiding the poor despite the hardship we find ourselves.

For any crisis facing the Muslim Ummah, whether locally, nationally, or internationally, turning together to Allah The Almighty must be the first source of refuge. Our Unity as Muslims, the next. An-Naseer (The Helper) is closer to us than our "jugular vein" (Qur'an 50 v16) and ever ready and willing to respond and aid (Qur'an 40 v60). What are we waiting for? We have the formula. We know the answer. However, the first step must be ours.

Islam is a way of life as well as a form of government, a social structure as well as a regulatory norm for interpersonal relationships, and business. It is not something different or from any other aspect of social life. It is a part of human life like any other. Islamic society preserves notions of free enterprise, social solidarity, social responsibility and humanistic concern for all which precedes self-interest.

This year, we have seen the rise in costs of utilities such as electricity and gas. The research, published in the peer-reviewed Ethnic and Racial Studies journal, confirmed the existence of a "Muslim penalty" in the employment market where both Muslim men and Muslim women were found to have significantly greater probability of unemployment than their respective white British Christian counterparts. As such, the cost-of-living crisis will certainly be felt by many Muslim families.

It is circumstances such as these that once again highlight the beautiful teachings of Islam and the solutions that it has for the world. Uthman bin 'Affan (May Allah be pleased with him) reported that the Messenger of

Allah (Peace and Blessings be upon him) said:

"There is no right that the son of Adam is more entitled to other than these (four) rights: (1) A home to live in, (2) a garment to cover his nakedness, (3) a piece of bread, and (4) water" [At-Tirmidhi].

The Messenger of Allah (Peace and Blessings be upon him) is talking about rights that we entitled to that are tangible physical rights from the state.

In another Hadith, it was narrated from Ibn 'Abbas that the Messenger of Allah (Peace and Blessings be upon him) said:

"The Muslims are partners in (co-owners of) three things: water, pasture, and fire - and their price is unlawful" [Ahmed].

Many of the scholars say that with regards to fire, it indicates any natural resources which are used to produce heat and energy, such as wood, coal and oil. We see here that in Islam, these utilities are not to be monopolised by private companies, they should belong to the state for benefit of the people and they cannot be withheld to the disadvantage of the people. In an Islamic model, it is therefore not permissible to adopt the model of liberal privatisation whereby even essential public utilities are sold to private companies and are therefore not available except to those who pay for them-leading to a society where only those with material wealth can access vital services.

The Lewisham Islamic Centre recognises that many from our community (Muslim and non-Muslim) will likely suffer from rise in the cost of utilities/commodities and we will be doing our utmost to help in whatever way we can to support the vulnerable. As such, we started a food bank at the Centre on 1 December 2022, and this will take place on the first Saturday of every month following that. Our winter soup kitchen also took place from 19 December 2022 – 02 January 2023. These services are open to all members of the community irrespective of their faith.

We hope that with your continued support, we can continue to help others.

# Religious Services

Imam Shakeel Begg (Head Imam), who is supported by Imam Sabir Elahi and Imam Ashraf Dabous (Deputy Imams), manages the spiritual and moral development of the community through leading:

- Daily Prayers, weekly classes, monthly Lectures, Friday and Eid Sermons;
- Arranging tours for visitors, organising
   ◆ outreach events, holding meetings, weekly Da'wah sessions and annual open days;
- Imam's Surgery, which includes: counselling, marriage solemnisation, dispute resolution.

# **Prayer Facilities**

At LIC, we can accommodate an average of 2000 attendees on a Friday (Jumu'ah), which increases during the month of Ramadan. Moreover, Eid in the Park averages 7000 attendees annually. Our Friday sermons (khutbah) are usually delivered by Imam Ashraf (deputy Imam), Imam Sabir (deputy Imam) and Imam Shakeel (Head Imam). On occasion, we have special guest Imams including Shaykh Haitham Haddad. We also encourage and instruct young Khatibs by giving them a platform at LIC to deliver the sermon (khutbah).



# Streaming & Social Media

LIC engages the community through Social Media updates of upcoming events, daily activities and live streams of the weekly sermon. Talks and lectures are regularly uploaded onto various social media platforms (Facebook, Telegram, Twitter, Instagram, and Youtube). This online content is for all to benefit from, but more importantly, it allows LIC to interact with members of the wider community, the local council, elected representatives and other organisations, thereby showcasing the valuable work being done within the community.

LIC has always been an active member of Lewisham Interfaith Forum (LIF). LIC along with other Faith Leaders organise regular activities that include Peace Walks, Interfaith Faith Discussions, Visits to Local Faith Centres, Press Releases, etc. Imam Shakeel Begg is also the Vice Chair of LIF.



# Workshops & Training

LIC is at the forefront of organising interactive Workshops & Training Sessions that are not only beneficial but relevant to our context and environment. We organised a Workshop on Home Financing as well as a Workshop on the economic crises with Cllr Amanda De Ryk.

# **Open Iftar**

Every Ramadan we invite our neighbours, Local Faith Leaders, Civic Leaders and Community Leaders to break fast with the Muslim Community inside the Mosque. We usually start this Event with some recitation from The Qur'an and short talks from our Imams, Faith and Civic Leaders. The Mayor of Lewisham, Damien Egan, Father Charles Pickstone of St Laurence Church, Father Steve Hall of St Mary's Church and Gerald Rose of the Catford & Bromley Synagogue have been regular guest speakers at this Event.

# **SACRE Meetings**

Imam Ashraf Dabous and Shaykh Syed Maqsud Elahi are both LIC representatives at SACRE. They attend the meetings and address religious issues that are connected to the curriculum taught at local Lewisham Schools.

# Feed the Homeless & Food Bank

Our Feed the Homeless Activity started over 5 years ago in Central London, but now our dedicated team of Volunteers focus on local needs. We have a Monthly Food Bank Project and a winter soup Kitchen that provides food items for the needy and elderly neighbours within the local area.





# Infomation Stall

Lewisham Islamic Centre Volunteers are noticeable every Saturday between 12 noon - 3pm outside of Lewisham Library at our information and dawah stall. We proactively engage the public who may be curious or even skeptical about Islam and Muslims, or who are actively learning about Islam. It offers conversations galore and free Islamic reading material to take away. It is an active way of making our presence as Muslims known and to instill confidence in the public to approach a Muslim and politely ask about our faith and true practices that are so strikingly at odds with what is nominally portrayed in the media.

# **Lewisham Works**

The Lewisham Works monthly drop advice session at the Masjid (2nd Thursday of each month 1pm -4:30pm) offers support to Lewisham resident members of the mosque who are seeking support to gain new skills and find employment.

The monthly drop-ins are delivered by Brother Tony Cisse who is both a member of the masjid and works for Lewisham Works. Brothers and Sisters aged 16 – 60+ are welcome to come and find out about the opportunities on offer.

Lewisham Works is a free service for unemployed residents and students which works closely with training partners and businesses to provide pathways into a range of jobs in various sectors.

Since the relaunch of the LIC drop in service in September 2022, people attending the drop in have been able to get a new CV, find work, get on courses, are helped with work clothes and travel costs for a new job. As one member of the masjid said; "Mashallah, I have been supported in applying for and getting a job when I did not know who to go to for help"

# Ramadan, Fasting & Economic Recession



As Ramadan comes again, another opportunity for sacrifice, reflection and self-education has arrived. This Ramadan seems to have come during a time wherein its lessons are needed most. A time of economic recession in many parts of the world, and at the very least economic struggle in other parts. The question is: what can we learn through Ramadan and fasting that will help us through current and future financial struggles?

Perhaps the most important lesson is self-control and sacrifice. Allah has prescribed upon us fasting as a means of attaining His pleasure through learning how to say no to the self and curb our desires. {O you who believe, the fasts have been enjoined upon you as they were enjoined upon those before you, so that you may be God-fearing}. This is an extremely important facet of piety and an integral ingredient to success in this life. Without the ability to say no to ourselves we will be tempted by sin, and we will be led by our desires. How does this relate to economic difficulties and recession? Through learning to say no to our desires we can learn to suffice with what we need rather than what we want. How much money is spent, and often wasted, on what we want rather than what we need? For those of us living in the west, financial struggles of the kind we are now facing may be novel and uncommon occurrence, but how many of our brothers and sisters globally suffer daily without the ability to acquire their needs whilst we run after our wants? Perhaps through this time we will learn what our needs are so that in the future we can say no to our wants, and instead look after those of our ummah who are in constant need.

Ramadan can also teach us to reflect on the amount of food, drink and water we waste. Yes, these may be needs but excessiveness in what we need should also be avoided. Perhaps our lack of gratitude for the blessings we have has contributed to the current economic difficulties. The society we inhabit subscribes to a consumerist way of life; the centre of focus is what we earn and what we can afford to buy or have. We are constantly reminded about new editions of current devices, yearly alterations to clothes we already own, seasonal fashions replacing current trends, culinary fads to be followed, and new must haves or must tries that we don't currently possess; what does this do to our hearts? It leaves them in a state of dissatisfaction and a lack of contentment with what is whilst constantly yearning for what isn't and what could be. Consumerism leads to a constant want and wish for more, which means we are constantly working to acquire and constantly replacing the seemingly old with new. This is perhaps the main contributing factor to the extreme amounts of petrol, gas, and other irreplaceable energy sources we burn through, leading to a need for more and an increase in costs. Through reflection Ramadan can teach us to think about the way we live and question our own roles in the current economic difficulties we face.

Finally, although there are many lessons to be learned, as a concluding lesson we can look to the sacrifices we make during Ramadan. Sacrifices for Allah's pleasure and a place in paradise. We give up that which is permissible during the day, we give up our time to pray during the night, and throughout the month we give up our wealth to help the needy and the poor. If we can utilise the spirit of sacrifice kindled in Ramadan outside of the blessed month and throughout the rest of the year, then we can help alleviate the burden of the financial struggles we face for others, and in doing so receive Allah's aid in the struggles we face ourselves. Abu Huraira reported: The Prophet, peace and blessings be upon him, said, "Allah continues to fulfil the needs of His servant as long as he fulfils the needs of his brother." 2

Ramadan is a time to recharge our spiritual batteries and better connect with Allah, and it also a time of practical learning and development. May Allah allow us to gain closeness to Him whilst we learn and develop ourselves.

# **Children Education** (Madarasah)

The Lewisham Islamic Institute has set out clear aims to nurture the next generation of Muslims who will preserve and advocate their religion wherever they go. Moreover, we also wish for students to become outstanding citizens and leaders who mirror the inward and outward character of our Prophet Muhammad (saw) and the vast role models found in our Islamic

The first aspect of learning Islam can be defined as the "theory", the essential information which all students need to guide them throughout their lives. Our curriculum seeks to develop students' knowledge of Quran, Hadeeth, relevant supplications, Islamic History, Seerah, Figh and Prophetic Manners. Additionally, our curriculum intends to be classical yet relevant. This means that we aim to teach with purpose, allowing benefits to be extracted from our classical and contemporary heritage rather than providing bare facts alone.

Therefore, we encourage students to discuss. debate and challenge ideas/ideologies even if they are their own and to critically think about the world around them.

The second principle surrounds the "implementation" of Islam. As an institute we understand the integral importance of learning the theory. However, we also comprehend the futility of the theory being abandoned by its sister called "practice". This point is illustrated by Dr Abdullah Nasih Ulwan in his book "Child Education in Islam" who quotes Sayyid Qutb:

Muhammad (saw) and his companions achieved victory only when they practiced and applied all the teachings of Islam. The Companions of the Prophet (saw) were examples in applying its teachings. When you saw them, you saw Islam. Hence the teachings alone do not change mankind, the Quran alone does not change mankind; and the texts alone don't change raising those who applied these teachings above simply making speeches.

Therefore, we intend to nurture students who will become fruits

never flourish.

Our third principle consists of "teaching" we want our students to become future leaders who go on to teach what they have teach our pupils so that our students can mirror them as respected role models, imitating their etiquettes and manners. But it must be noted that not all teaching occurs in classrooms and this is important as many of our students will go on to become scholars, doctors, entrepreneurs, engineers, nurses and head-teachers. However wherever they travel and whatever occupation they choose to hold, we strive for pupils to not only teach through their statements but to remember to also

children currently memorising the book of Allah. By the grace of Allah so far 8 children (5 boys & 3 girls) have managed to memorise the entire Quran at the masjid. Among the current cohort of students 3 boys have memorised about 25 ajzaa & are inshaa Allah on their way to become huffazul quran soon. Some of the young huffaz from the masjid have now proceeded to memorise the quran in different rewayah (mode of recitation). They also help the current hifz students in memorising the book of Allah. We currently deliver classes covering the following:

We aim to expand and enhance our teaching platform by conveying classes in Adab, Fiqh, Usool Al Fiqh, Seerah, Tafseer, Uloom Al Quran, Mustalah Al Hadeeth, Nahu, Sarf, Balagah and more. Moreover, we wish to cater our classes to the entire community which is why we endeavour to establish structured courses/programmes which commence at a beginners level and continue on to an advanced stage.

Ultimately, our aim is to disseminate tailored courses by qualified instructors who comprehend the challenges and solutions for Muslims residing as minorities in the West.



# **Friday Collection**

As a growing and thriving Centre, funding is paramount and 99% of the Centre's income is generated from the Muslim community. The majority of this comes from weekly collections after Friday prayers which on average has increased to £3,200 per week compared to the 2021 where the average was £2,700 per week. In addition to cash collections, we are using SumUp machines that allow the attendees to simply tap/touch their payment cards and donate with ease. Moreover, three charity boxes with PDQ devices at the entrance to the Centre encourages attendees to donate.

# **Standing Orders**

Supplementary income for LIC comes from standing order mandates. We collect £2360 in standing orders every month. If you would like to make regular donations through standing order, refer to the back page of the annual report.

### **Online Donations**

We also use the online platforms such Gocardless, paypal on the LIC website, and Facebook donation to raise funds. So far the average we have raised on a monthly basis is £583.53 online through these portals. If you would like to donate to LIC, refer to the back page of the annual report.

# Fundraising for the New Development

On the 27th night every Ramadan, an online /onsite fundraiser is held to realise the vision of leaving a Legacy through the development of a purpose built mosque and Islamic Centre in the London borough of Lewisham. Money pledges are collected where attendees are not in a position to donate lump sums, and these pledges are redeemed over specified period of time. The event is live streamed on YouTube where viewers are encouraged to donate online or via phone. This past Ramadan, we raised £160,603.35 as pledges and so far £115,605.35 has been collected.
